

The A.A.C.A. South Florida Region Board Meeting of Tuesday, May 6, 2025 was called to Order by President Tomás Hernández at 7:32 p.m., at Rinconcito Latino Café, 9606 SW 72<sup>nd</sup> Street, Miami, FL 33173.

**In Attendance:** President Tomás Hernández, 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President Al Padilla, 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President Ed Medina, Secretary Yovanna Hernández, Treasurer Manny Garcia, Immediate Past President Millie Garcia and Board Members Benjamin Cardonne, Chico Goldsmith, George Harvey, Jean Hawa, Thomas Kosky, Mike Penn, Ira Shapiro and Bob Squier.

**Establish a Quorum:** President Tomás Hernández was able to establish a quorum with 14 members of the board present.

**First Order of Business - Acceptance of Board Meeting Minutes from Previous Meeting:** President Tomás Hernández asked if everyone present had read the minutes of the April board meeting; if so, and if there were no questions, comments, or corrections, would someone move to accept the minutes as posted. Jean Hawa made a motion to accept the minutes; Chico Goldsmith seconded it. Having no other discussion, the motion was voted on and passed.

**Second Order of Business – Treasurer's Report:** Manny Garcia presented a reconciliation statement for April from the club's bank account. Manny added that with membership renewals, new memberships, monthly expenses such as coffee and dessert at the board and general meetings, storage rental fee and the printing and mailing of *Sidelights*, our treasury is sound.

**Third Order of Business – Membership Report:** Ed Medina reported that as of now we are back to 214 active families.

He added that not only was it a phenomenal show but once the special lights at the venue were turned on, it became a beautiful site. Manny Garcia added that the food was very good. **70<sup>th</sup> Club Anniversary Celebration (May 17, 2025)**- Ed Medina said that everything is set for the party. He mentioned that we have 87 confirmed reservations. He also added that a photo booth with our logo in the picture was being donated by Tony Herrnandez, Auto Detailing Supplies offered a discount to our members, Williamson Cadillac donated pens and a bag, Benjamin Cardonne donated coffee mugs with our 70<sup>th</sup> year anniversary logo. The club was adding a couple of more surprises to the goodie bag given to everyone attending the celebration.

Separately, we are carefully looking at the potential that the EPA will allow for E15 use year round in some parts of our country. This could have a significant impact on our ability to purchase fuel suitable for our vehicles, especially if this fuel expands into states that do not permit the sale of ethanol free gasoline. #### PROTECTING THE RIGHT TO REPAIR AND MODIFY VEHICLES

We remain focused on protecting enthusiasts' rights to modify vehicles legally and is working to ensure that its members have access to the information, tools, and tolerances for motor vehicles with advanced technology, including advanced driver assistance systems (ADAS), to ensure they can be safely modified. Similarly, with the federal highway bill up for reauthorization in 2026, which historically includes vehicle safety mandates from Congress, SEMA and PRI advocate for why the federal government should not mandate a maximum ride height for motor vehicles, among other potential mandates. In 2025, we will also push for more state level reforms to ensure transparent and objective standards while highlighting the aftermarket industry's ability to innovate and offer products that enhance performance, customization, and safety.

SEMA and PRI estimate there are approximately 12 million pre-1990 classic vehicles on the road.

## DEFENSE OF CLASSIC VEHICLES AND COLLECTOR RIGHTS

SEMA and PRI defend the rights of classic car owners and enthusiasts against state-level policies that impose unreasonable restrictions on older and modified vehicles. In 2025, we will prioritize efforts to combat restrictive titling and registration laws that target imported vehicles, including those that impose unnecessary hurdles for vehicles more than 25 years old. We also will work to protect vehicle owners from overly harsh exhaust noise laws, which unfairly penalize car enthusiasts and undermine the automotive hobby.



#### A.A.C.A. – South Florida Region History

The creation of the A.A.C.A. – South Florida Region was a natural evolution from years of work by dedicated enthusiasts. In May of 1955 Charles Sebastian called a meeting of local car owners for the purpose of establishing a local antique car club. Approximately twenty people attended this meeting held at Frankie Watts' Waco Motors. From this session came the Miami Old Car Club with sixteen charter members. The club elected Charles Sebastian as its first president, a post that he held for three years. The first big display of cars came at the 1957 Dinner Key Auto Show. Ten thousand people paid twenty-five cents admission to see the thirty-six cars on display. About this time the membership decided to change the club's name to the Vintage Car Club of Miami. It was felt that this was more descriptive of the club's intent.

With a membership of 140, the club was incorporated as a nonprofit corporation during the latter part of 1957. In May 1958 the club began publication of *Sidelights*, a name coined by charter member Bob Gegen. Sidelights is the official publication of the club and is published nine times a year. The first annual show was held at Crandon Park, followed by West Flagler Dog track and the Miami Springs Villas. Then, for the next eight years the show was held at Villa Vizcaya, the former winter residence of industrialist James Deering on the shores of Biscayne Bay. In early 1965 a move was started by Charles Sebastian to affiliate the club with the Antique Car Club of America. In September 1965 the club sent a petition to the national headquarters for the formation of the South Florida Region. The Region was approved in October, and at the November meeting the "Vintage Car Club of Miami" officially became the "South Florida Region of the Antique Automobile Club of America".

After many years of being the South Florida Region of the Antique Automobile Club of America, another change was needed. Following an eighteen-month process, we had been approved by the Internal Revenue Service as a not-for-profit hobbyist organization as recognized under I.R.S. code section 501 (C) (7). The entity was reorganized as the Miami Collector Vehicle Association, Inc. doing business as A.A.C.A.-South Florida Region. With a bylaws amendment, this went into effect on September 19, 2013.

In 1971 the club created the Most Valuable Member Award. This award is given to the member who by vote of the membership has contributed the most to the club over the past year. The award is presented at the annual year-end Holiday Party. To honor his memory and his many contributions, the award was renamed the **Darcy O'Meara Award** after his untimely death in 1979.

In 1980 we celebrated the 25th anniversary of the club's founding. The occasion was marked with a banquet honoring the club's founder, Charles Sebastian, and all the past presidents. It was time to look back at the first quarter-century of the club and make plans for the second quartercentury. Early in 1983 the South Florida Region absorbed the Vintage Car Club of Miami, which had been founded in 1963. By combining the two organizations, everyone benefited. A single club provided more automobiles for our shows and more manpower to run them. Organization and management were more easily carried out, and the treasury responded in kind. Our growth expanded, and in 1986 we joined with the City of Homestead to take part in the annual Frontier Days celebration. This provided sponsorship and a fine location for our winter show. The excellent show field and support from the city led to our first National Meet in 1991. The success of the national event has continued with top -quality shows in Homestead each January. Despite the catastrophic events caused by Hurricane Andrew in August 1992 (including the destruction of many classic and antique cars in the club), the club managed to maintain its membership and grew nicely in the mid 1990's.

The growth of the club over the years has been steady and strong. The year 1995 ushered in the era of new leadership with Bob Mayer as president for a record seven terms. Membership meetings moved to a new location in the heart of Kendall and were well attended every month.

In 1996, the club was engaged to present the prestigious *Memory Lane* exhibit as part of the South Florida International Auto Show at Miami Beach Convention Hall. Memory Lane has established itself as the most heavily attended classic car display in south Florida with well over a half million spectators yearly. This event has provided the cornerstone of our annual budget and earned our club a stellar reputation as the premiere antique car club in South Florida. Sadly, in 1997, our club founder Charles Sebastian passed away. The prestigious Memory Lane Best of Show Award is dedicated to his memory each year. (continued on page 7)

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One of the highlights of the club has been the steady enhancement of our Sidelights newsletter. Al Roscoe was the first South Florida Region Editor to receive the National Master Editor Award in 1982. In addition to his duties as president, Bob Mayer became the editor of Sidelights and our annual roster in 1998, incorporating the transformation to color printing and graphics. These improvements were recognized by AACA by awarding him the National Master Editor Award in 1999. In 2003, Ernesto Romero, improved Sidelights with enhanced artwork and graphics and was awarded the AACA Award of Excellence. Starting in October 2007, Jean Hawa took over the helm at Sidelights, to continue the terrific job of former editors Al Roscoe, George W. Duvall III, Maurice Hawa, Ben Harris, Bob Mayer, Ernesto The 2008, 2009, 2012, and Romero, and Bob Squier. 2013 Award of Excellence for regional publications and National Master Editor Award in 2010, 2011, 2014-2024 were presented to Editor Hawa. The Ann S. Eady Memorial Award, the highest national award for editors was presented to Jean Hawa at the 2020 Annual Convention.

In 2001, our first website was launched on the Internet. Due to the diligent efforts of our webmaster Bob Squier, Southfloridaregion.aaca.com became the up-to-date the source for everything about our club, more enjoyable and easier to navigate. Within hours after a car show, the event pictures are posted to our website for viewing pleasure. This has created a public journal to attract sponsors and members. Bob Squier has earned the AACA Webmaster Award of **Excellence** eleven times as one of the finest in the country. Since then, Bob has earned the Award of Master Webmaster in 2012–2021. The Sparkplug Award, the highest national award for webmasters was presented to Bob Squier at the 2020 Annual Convention. In 2022 Bob Squier handed over the reins of the website to Ed Medina, who has maintained the foundation that Bob had created, Ed earned the 2023 Award of Excellence for regional websites.

Chaired by Norman Kassoff, the South Florida Region hosted the 2010 Southeastern Winter Nationals Meet at the Homestead Speedway after a nineteen-year hiatus. Over 250 cars came from the eastern part of the United States. Show day was a beautiful sunny, picture-perfect day. One year later, co-chaired by Ira Shapiro and Mel Mann, we hosted the successful 2011 Southeastern Winter Meet. Held at the Magic City Casino on Leap Day, the 2020 AACA Nationals Southeastern Winter Meet was smoothly executed by Cochairs Manny and Millie Garcia. In March, the entire country was shut down due to COVID-19, cancelling all car events until the Spring of 2021. In January of 2023 the South Florida Region headed by Millie Garcia again hosted the 2023 Winter Nationals at the Gold Coast Railroad Museum.

In addition to Memory Lane, several car shows are presented each year for the public enjoyment of our hobby, which have provided a financial basis for improved membership benefits. Our current shows include venues of Art Deco Weekend on Ocean Drive on South Beach, along Biltmore Way in Coral Gables, Vintage Auto Show at the Historic Deering Estate, and the most current, the Vizcaya Farm Village Car Show. Due to our commitment to the community, the Dade Heritage Trust presented our club with the 2008 **Outstanding Community Service Award** and the Deering Estate Foundation deemed us their **2017 Marketing and Engagement Partner**.

As a result of our successes, the **AACA National Corvette Award** was established in 2011 by the South Florida Region AACA in recognition of Mel Mann's years of dedication and service to the hobby. We salute our leaders for their diligent efforts of maintaining the highest standards and for sharing our great hobby with the community at events located throughout Miami-Dade County. Now, in our 70<sup>th</sup> year, the

club has grown to 214 and is regaining its strength, meetings are increasing and the future is bright for continued growth and success.





#### **APRIL 26 GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING**

The email to our members started off with "Next meeting – Saturday April 26– Something New– Come and join us for our April Members Meeting– Cars, Coffee & Donuts. We will be meeting Saturday morning April 26<sup>th</sup> at Detail Garage-Miami"... "Even though you may not be a member yet, or even own an antique car, you are welcome to come to our Membership Meeting to find out more about our club". The time, location and other information followed.





Members and newcomers started arriving at 9 a.m. with coffee and doughnuts awaiting us. We socialized, looked at the antiques, did the usual car talk, and had a brief business meeting. Once we entered the building, owner Eddie Lopez welcomed us and gave everyone a tour of the facility with a thorough explanation of the how and why detailing is important for one's vehicle.











There was a great emphasis on cleaning because it enhances a car's appearance. Mr. Lopez walked us around the shop stopping at the well-identified sections where he showed us different products and manufacturers based on a customer's needs. They include: (1) Washing with soap and water should be the main objective to maintain all vehicles. One should remove the dirt and use a PH balanced soap with ceramics. One should wash in one direction, not in circles because it is easier to remove the dirt lines; have a rinse bucket that will trap the dirt at the bottom of the bucket. (2) Dry with towels. Wheels and trim need attention, too. (3) The interior seats should be cleaned with a horse hair brush and then conditioned. The carpet and upholstery cleaning process has three steps: soap, elimination and finish. (4) There are certain compounds for glass and paint. Scratches and swirl marks need to be eliminated. When one gets a new car, the car dealers usually don't do a good job giving you a clean car. (continued on page 15)

One should have a professional cleaning to have the car look great. There are compounds to remove scratches and swirls which could have been from over spraying at the factory which prevented a good shine on the vehicle. There are a variety of ceramic waxes and sealants. (6) There are "quick detail sprays and "waterless" washes. When dusting, one should use a lot of rags, folding the towels each time with every swipe. (7) There are blower kits to clean engine parts. (8) Towels are needed for washing, drying and buffing. Many people use microfiber cloths and others prefer chamois which come in different sizes, colors, quality and prices. They are easily cleaned with soap and water. Be advised that cheap microfiber towels can scratch the paint. (9) Dirt trap buckets can help prevent scratches. (10) Polishing cloths come in many different grades and package sizes.

Suppliers for Detail-Garage–Miami are from Germany, France, Great Britain, Italy and China. Each company offers products unique to meet car manufacturers or car owners needs.

When asked about clay bars, Lopez said that they have come a long way. They are used to remove contaminants from the paint. A car is washed and dried, a lubricant is applied and then the clay bar is rubbed with back and forth movements, never circles, and when it feels smooth, wipe off the residue and apply wax or a sealant. It comes in different grades (mild, medium, heavy).

Two-day detailing classes are offered to those who are interested in learning how to do their own detailing.

After visiting the area used for detailing client's vehicles, several members shopped for supplies to do their own cleaning and/or detailing. Everyone left with a greater understanding and appreciation for detailing.

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#### **RICH'S REPAIR RAMBLINGS: TECHNICAL ARTICLE**

Modern tools have spoiled us, mostly for the better. Before the invention of the electric drill, holes were bored in wood with an offset hand crank. Imagine a carpenter in 1850, drilling holes by hand in 4x4 beams all day long when building a house! Today, tools with digital readouts have become the norm. Yet there are times when a simpler way still works, some might argue for the better.

When I restored my BMW Isetta in the 1990s, I owned precision measuring tools including a micrometer and vernier calipers, but calibrated in inches. Everything on the Isetta was metric, and I needed a tool able to measure to tenths of a millimeter. At the time, I was purchasing new metric hardware from a company near my office, and they also sold metric vernier calipers, for which I recall paying under \$20, including a protective case. The calipers were plastic, but seemed to be wellmade.

(Fun fact: "vernier" is defined in the dictionary a movable, auxiliary graduated scale attached to a main graduated scale, calibrated to indicate subdivisions of the larger scale. The word comes from the surname of its inventor, Pierre Vernier, who died in 1637. Little could he have imagined his invention still used 385 years later.)

Both a micrometer and vernier calipers can precisely measure the outside diameter of an object; the additional advantages of vernier calipers is their ability to also measure inside diameter as well as depth of an opening. My new tool was a joy to use, and came in handy for all kinds of measurements when rebuilding the engine, transmission, and chassis. More recently, I used the calipers to measure the pistons in my Alfa Romeo's brake calipers ("calipers" defined as something with two moveable arms).




In the photo below, the inside diameter jaws are circled in red, the outside diameter jaws in blue, the locking tab which prevents the sliding portion of the tool from moving to preserve a measurement in green, and a thumb wheel for ease in making precise movements of the scale in yellow.



To read the scale, first, locate the "zero" on the sliding portion of the scale; if it lines up exactly with a line on the fixed portion of the scale, you have your measurement in a whole millimeter (as seen in the photo of the brake piston: the "0" on the top, or sliding, scale, lines up exactly with the "30" on the bottom, or fixed, scale). However, if the zero mark is between two lines, your first number is the lower of the two (if the mark is between "3" and "4", your first number is "3"). Next, find the line on the sliding scale which lines up most precisely with a line on the main scale. Remember that this number represents TENTHS of a millimeter. To obtain your final result, add the two numbers together.

In the photo below, I am measuring the brake pad material thickness on a brand-new pad. Using the inside jaws, I see that the zero mark on the sliding scale is between the 9 and the 10 on the fixed scale, so our initial number is "9". Next, I look for the mark on the sliding scale which most closely lines up with a mark on the fixed scale. The closest number on the sliding scale which does that is the 5. This represents "0.5mm". Adding our two numbers together, 9 + .5 equals 9.5. The brake pad material is 9.5mm thick.

Not shown in the photos is the metal tang which protrudes from the end of the vernier calipers as the sliding scale is moved. The tang is used to measure depth, for example, into a blind hole. This is very convenient, for example, when determining what length bolt might best fit into a threaded opening.

My vernier calipers are very handy to use: they are light, easy to adjust, and quickly provide a readout. Even when I might otherwise grab a ruler for measurements which do not need to be so precise, I find myself reaching for these vernier calipers. As an example, if I'm sorting through metric hardware and need to sort bolts by length, it's easier to measure the bolts with vernier calipers than it is with a ruler.

Sometimes I rank my tools based on a price range, such as "that's the best X dollars I've ever spent on a tool!" I would say that my plastic vernier calipers, which have held up beautifully for 30 years, would rank as "the best \$20 I've ever spent on a tool!". If you don't own one and you need to do precise measuring of any kind, I and Pierre Vernier both highly recommend it.

#### CHECK OUT A STORY ABOUT THE FIRST WORKING SELF-PROPELLED VEHICLE

Nicolas-Joseph Cugnot (26 February 1725 – 2 October 1804) was a French inventor who built the first working self-propelled land-based mechanical vehicle, in 1769, the world's first "automobile."

In 2010, a copy of the "fardier de Cugnot" was built by pupils at the Arts et Métiers ParisTech, a French Grande école, and the city of Void-Vacon. This replica worked perfectly, proving that the concept was viable and verifying the truth and results of the 1769 vehicle.
