The A.A.C.A. South Florida Region Board Meeting of Tuesday, June 6, 2023, was called to Order by President Millie Garcia at 7:17 P.M., at Rinconcito Latino Café, 9606 SW 72<sup>nd</sup> Street, Miami, FL 33173.

**In Attendance:** President Millie Garcia, 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President Tomás Hernández, 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President Al Padilla, Secretary Yovanna Hernández, Treasurer Manny Garcia and Board Members, Chico Goldsmith, Jean Hawa, Ed Medina, Mike Penn, Bob Squier and Richard Whittington.

**Establish a Quorum:** President Millie Garcia established a quorum with 11 members present.

First Order of Business - Acceptance of Board Meeting Minutes from Previous Month: President Millie Garcia asked if everyone present had read the minutes of last month's board meeting; if so, and if there were no questions, comments, or corrections, would someone move to accept the minutes, Tomás Hernández made a motion to accept the minutes as posted, Manny Garcia seconded it. Having no other discussion, the motion was voted on and passed.

### **COMMERCIAL VEHICLE ENFORCEMENT**

If you were driving behind the truck in this photo; WAIT! Why would you ever drive behind something like this? What possibly could go wrong?

The above photo was shown to the AACA South Florida Region members at our May 18<sup>th</sup> General Membership Meeting. Our guest speaker, Florida Highway Patrol Trooper Sal Scalia, provided pertinent information about "Commercial Vehicle Enforcement".

## Safety is the Name of the Game

- Crashes SFY 2014-15
  - 344,247 total crashes investigated
  - 35,829 crashes investigated involving CMVs
  - 205 CMV fatality crashes resulting in 242 fatalities
- Florida's Commercial Vehicle Safety Plan
  - Outreach
  - Partnerships
  - Inspections and Traffic Enforcement
  - Motor carrier interventions



Even though the data shown above is not current, it shows us that 10.4% of commercial vehicles were a part of 242 deaths. SMS is the Safety Management System which is designed to incorporate the safety-based regulations related to motor carrier operations. The SMS assesses compliance and

prioritizes carriers for interventions based on their on-road performance and investigation results. On-road performance includes data collected from roadside inspections and crash reports; investigation results include violations discovered within the previous 12 months.

Florida Highway Patrol/Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Troopers have a mission to (1) enforce Commercial Regulations (CFR) and Florida State Statutes with an emphasis on commercial vehicles to reduce CMV related crashes, (2) conduct weight enforcement to protect our roadways, highways, and bridges (see following photo) and (3) try to remove dangerous drivers and unsafe vehicles from travelling our roads. [Did you notice the FHP car on the grass to the left of the overloaded truck in the photo on the left?]

The Delray Beach Concours was held on June 17, 2023, on what turned out to be a very hot and humid Saturday with the threat of major thunderstorms by 1:00 PM. Still 100 cars, ranging from a 1903 Sears Motor Buggy to a 2018 Ford GT were laid out on the grass field of Old School Square Park. The show field comprised of Classes for American, British, Italian, German cars, with specific classes for Rolls Royce, Ferrari, Porsche and Mercedes-Benz. Along with a display of Superformance Cobra reproductions, Microcars, Motorcycles and a Firetruck and SWAT Vehicle from the City of Delray Beach. There was a little something for everyone.

### **How Can My Car Be More Original?**

AACA created the HPOF Class (Historical Preservation of Original Features) in 1988 and introduced the "survivor" car to the antique automobile hobby and suddenly having an original unrestored car adds value to it. One of the many reasons to preserve original cars is to document the actual factory construction of the car including paint, upholstery and mechanical parts as aides to restoration of the same or similar car. From these cars, we can document the size of the flake in a metallic paint or the stitching and seams used in the upholstery as well as the finish on the mechanical parts of the car.

The evaluation process for receiving a HPOF Certification is much the same as in class judging. Parts that wear can be replaced with new or rebuilt parts if they have the same appearance as the original part. These areas are the most common deductions in evaluating a HPOF car. Correcting these items will improve the score of your car and many times makes the difference between receiving an Original Certification and a Repeat HPOF Certification. Common deductions which are easily corrected are:

- -Incorrect hose clamps,
- -Flex hoses instead of molded hoses,
- -Incorrect battery (sealed battery rather than a battery with individual caps, carrying strap on the battery, a color other than that provided by the factory, etc.)
- -Oil filter that is not a factory color.
- -Replacement water pump left in raw cast metal rather than painted engine color,
- -Aftermarket floor mats,
- -Battery cables not in factory colors or with clamp on terminal ends or missing battery hold down,
- -Incorrect radiator cap,
- -Non-factory color distributor cap or wires,
- -Non-matching head lights.
- -Aftermarket sound equipment or speakers,
- -Tires (size must be as supplied by the manufacturer)

Any unrestored car or motorcycle that is 25 years old or older is eligible to be entered in the HPOF classification for evaluation. The first time the vehicle is shown it is evaluated for the HPOF Award. Vehicles that receive their HPOF Certification are automatically considered for the highest level HPOF Original Award the next time it is shown. If it does not receive the Original Award, a Repeat HPOF Award is given as long as it still meets the

requirements of the HPOF level. Repeat HPOF Original
Awards are also given after receiving the HPOF Original
Award. At a higher level, there are three HPOF National
Awards given at the Annual Meeting. These awards are
for HPOF - Motorcycles, HPOF – Through 1929 and HPOF
on of
- Post 1929. These awards are selected from all vehicles
shown in the HPOF Class during the year.

### A True Garage Find - Part I
